## **MINISTER'S CORNER**

UNBOUND by the Reverend Amy Carol Webb, Minister



(From a true story found in the San Francisco Chronicle.)

ou may have heard the true story of a female humpback whale off the Pacific coast that had become entangled and weighted down in a spider web of crab traps and line that weighed hundreds of pounds and caused her to struggle to stay afloat. The 45- to 50foot female humpback, estimated to weigh 50 tons, was on the humpbacks' usual migratory route between the Northern California coast and Baja California when it became entangled in the nylon ropes that link crab pots.

A fisherman spotted her just east of the Farallones Islands in the Pacific Ocean, and radioed an environmental group for help. Within a few hours, the rescue team arrived and deter-

mined that she was so bad off, the only way to save her was to dive


in and untangle her from some 20 crab-pot ropes cinched so tight around her they were digging into her blubber, leaving visible cuts. Crab pot ropes are 240 feet long with 90-pound weights every 60 feet. One rope was wrapped at least four times around the tail, the back and the left front flipper, and there was a line in the whale's mouth.

As the injured whale struggled to stay afloat, divers spent about an hour cutting the ropes with a special curved knife. The whale floated passively in the water the whole time, giving off a strange kind of vibration, the rescuers said. The diver who freed the whale from

the rope in its mouth said, "When I was cutting the line going through the mouth, its eye was there winking at me, watching me. It was an epic moment of my life."

When the whale realized she was free, she began swimming around in circles, according to the rescuers. And then it swam to each diver, nuzzled him and then swam to the next one.

Reading this story, it occurred to me that when we are in Beloved Community, we are present in all three elements of this story. It's easy enough to see ourselves in the whale and in the rescuers. Each of us has been or perhaps is today tangled in painful circumstance beyond our control. And each of us has the power to help free those around us who

May you be brave of hand and heart to help others loosen whatever struggles, whatever sorrows, whatever fears cut into in their bodies, minds or spirits. May River of Grass dare to take up the special curved knife of love and justice that our faith may free ourselves and our world.

Children participating in the program are required to write a Chalice lighting, write a paper about the meaning of the Chalice, meet with the minister to discuss their paper and chalice lighting and serve 2-3 years as Kindlers of the Flame.

Our third and final milestone celebrates the transition from childhood to young adulthood. Growing into maturity is a momentous occasion in many religions, and Unitarian Universalism is no different. During our Affirmation program our participants will be challenged to reflect, articulate and practice their UU faith. Our program consists of four major parts: pairing youth with adult mentors from the congregation; discussions and retreats that emphasize selfawareness and UU identity; service to the congregation and community; and a culminating affirmation ceremony. This final ceremony gives the congregation an opportunity to welcome the youth into the adult community. Those Affirmed will be given an opportunity visit Boston as a group and to then join the congregation upon completion of the program.




Saturday, March 16<sup>th</sup>, from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm: Pastoral Care Counseling, River of Grass Office

Read: *The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness* by Michelle Alexander (The New Press) on **Sunday, March 17**<sup>th</sup> at 12:00 noon (after her service and hospitality time). Grab some tea, coffee, or juice and join us for a lively guided discussion.

Michelle Alexander, an attorney who is a civil rights advocate and litigator, asserts that crimefighting policies and systems in the U.S., such as the "war on drugs" and the incarceration system, disproportionately and intentionally affect Americans of color. She describes multifaceted, lifelong discrimination and disenfranchisement that affect people who are branded "felon."
