FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT Zena Tucker



rever row a boat with several other people? Experience the frustration when the other occupants steer in ways you don't understand? Become alarmed when the boat wobbles (or topples!) when one person leans one way and the rest another? Experienced paddlers know the smoothest, most efficient and fastest way to row a boat is in sync.

This idea is a bit troubling to we independent-thinking Unitarian Universalists. We defend and honor our Fourth Principle: "The free and responsible search for truth and meaning." At first glance, It's easy to conclude that moving in harmony is the same as acquiescing.

Recently, scientists explored the synchronized rowing. http://physicstoday.scitation.org/doi/10.1063/PT.3.3606. They noted that aquatic-rowing many-legged creatures such as krill and fishing spiders actually use out-of-sync swimming to reduce fluctuations in speed and friction. Could asynchronous rowing improve human rowboats? The researchers conducted experiment after experiment taking one or more oars at different timing from the others. In each case, when the rowing was out of sync, the mean speed was slower than that of a vessel with paddling all together. Why such a difference between natural creatures and humans in rowboats?



The answer: Unlike the krill, rowers propel the boat forward even during the recovery time. When the paddles are lifted, the rowers move forward inside the boat, providing a forward force to the boat even during this coasting time. Amazingly, while the rowers rest and ready for the next big push of the paddle, they are still propelling the boat forward.

I find this to be a profound idea. Consider our beloved River of Grass and each of us with an oar to do our part. What breathtaking new horizons will we explore? What new bonds will we form as we paddle? And as we glide along this summer and recover, let us realize, we are still a mighty forward-moving force.

Our third principle: "Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations" encourages us. Perhaps syncing with others is not so much acquiescing, but really a beautiful harmonizing.

It was my honor and pleasure to paddle with you as Board President these last two years, and I look forward to rowing in harmony with you on this beautiful River in the coming year.

"HOLLYWOOD, TAKE DOWN THE CONFEDERATE STREET SIGNS!"

Protest Hollywood street signs on Wednesday, August 30. Three streets in Hollywood are named after Confederate Generals: Lee, Hood and Forrest. And Nathan Forrest is a founder of the KKK. We will rally in front of Hollywood City Hall at 2600 Hollywood Boulevard with signs, chants and speakers at 12 pm. At about 1 pm we will march inside the commission chamber during their meeting. They are scheduled to take up and vote on their proposed ordinance to rename the three streets.

Confederate symbols are hate symbols and do not belong on public streets. At the Commission meeting on June 21,150 protestors peacefully demonstrated and the city Commission agreed to take up the renaming of the three streets.

Getting to Know UU's

"Getting to Know UU's" is a new monthly feature of the newsletter suggested and written by Kathy Jens-Rochow.

HORACE GREELEY (1811-1872): Founder and editor of the New York Tribune; labor and women's rights activist

orace Greeley was personally offended by the sensationalist newspapers of the period, and worked to make the *New York Tribune* a credible newspaper for the masses. Though the paper was fairly conservative politically, Greeley advanced opinions that deviated from the standard Whig orthodoxy. He supported women's rights and labor, and he opposed monopolies.

He hired early feminist Margaret Fuller (another famous Unitarian) to write for the Tribune, making her the first female newspaper columnist in New York City.

He was the candidate for the new Liberal Republican party in the 1872 presidential election against incumbent President Ulysses S. Grant. Greeley died just before the election.

Horace Greeley is generally credited with having coined the often-quoted phrase "Go West, young man." However John B. L. Soule, an Indiana journalist, had written "Go West, young man, and grow up with the country" earlier, in an editorial in the *Terre Haute (Indiana) Express* in 1851. Greeley, later, wrote, "Do not lounge in the cities! There is room and health in the country, away from the crowds of idlers and imbeciles. Go west, before you are fitted for no life but that of the factory."

There's gold in them that hills boxes!

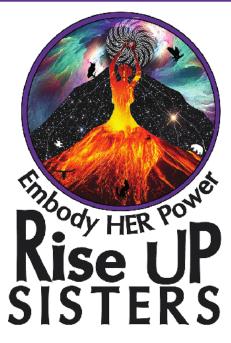

UUJF partners with UUs in Florida and other justice organizations to promote justice, equity and compassion in public policy. Our three core issues are Climate Change, Escalating Inequality and Justice for All.

UUJF supports the Voting Rights Restoration Amendment. https://floridarrc.com/ Forty-eight River of Grass members have already signed it to have a constitutional amendment on the ballot in November, 2018 to restore the voting rights of over 1,500,000 non-violent ex-felons in Florida who have paid their debt to society.



UUJF is a membership organization. All Unitarian Universalists in Florida are members. We will have an online Annual Meeting on Saturday, September 16, at 10 am by Zoom video conference link to share input on our core issues and to discuss justice issues. A zoom link will be sent out later.
